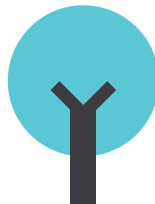

Palacký University Olomouc

Palacký University, established in 1573, is one of the leading centers of teaching and research in the Czech Republic. It currently comprises of eight faculties and offers degrees in a wide range of disciplines including medicine, other natural sciences, humanities, social sciences as well as law. Recently, one of the highest priorities of the university is to strengthen its international cooperation with other higher education institutions. Yearly, more than 1,700 international students study at Palacký University.

Palacký University is located in the historical and dynamic city of Olomouc. The picturesque town has a long and interesting history and is surrounded by splendid nature. According to the travel guide Lonely Planet, Olomouc is one of the “hidden gems” of Europe. The city of Olomouc is also well-known for its high density of university students. With over 20,000 students in the city of 100,000 inhabitants, Olomouc has the highest density of university students in Central Europe. Students surely appreciate the affordable cost of living in Olomouc in comparison with other Czech cities. In this context, it is worth mentioning that the cost of living in the Czech Republic is generally much lower than in Western Europe.

About the Department of Development & Environmental Studies

The department is an open, progressive and dynamically growing academic department within the Faculty of Science. It provides educational opportunities and conducts research in the areas of development studies, environmental studies and foresight. Its aim is to inspire our students, professionals and the public and thus contribute to the sustainable development of civil society. International Development Studies Master Program

The Master's program in International Development Studies taught in English is the first of its kind in the Czech Republic and in the region of Central and Eastern Europe and is open to students worldwide.

It is a two-year, full-time program designed not only for Bachelor students with development studies background but also for students from related fields who are interested in international development.

The program provides students with key knowledge and skills for a deeper understanding of problems affecting developing countries and the policies of international development including the skills for qualitative and quantitative research. The study program is based on three main pillars:

- Theoretical background – seven compulsory courses and three seminars
- Methodological background – a choice between quantitative and qualitative methods
- Regional orientation – two courses applying theoretical knowledge to regional opportunities of development. Students can choose from four regions: Africa, Latin America, Southeast Asia, and the Middle East and Central Asia.

Upon successful completion of the program, students are awarded the title of “Magister”, abbreviated as “Mgr.” which is equivalent to Master of Science (MSc). Graduates are equipped to work in the field of international development in the public sector, private industry as well as in governmental and non-governmental organizations at both national and international levels. Graduates can also find the opportunity to work as experts in projects run in low-income countries especially in the project organization and administration both in the donor and target country, in diplomatic service, or in the academic sector.

Foresight for Environment and Development Master's Program

The main aim of the Foresight for Environment and Development program is to prepare foresight-focused professionals for careers in environmental and developmental policy and practice. The duration of the program is two years. Students will be awarded the title of “Magister” (abbreviated as “Mgr.”) which is the equivalent to a Master of Science (M.Sc.). The Foresight for Environment and Development program is the first of its kind in the Czech Republic and in the region of Central and Eastern Europe.

Foresight is the ability to describe what may happen or may be needed in the future while considering the future as something that we can create or shape. Foresight assumes that the future is not pre-determined, but that it can evolve in different directions. Foresight includes thinking about the future, debating the future and shaping the future in addition to using participatory and multidisciplinary approaches. Development is a branch of social science that addresses issues in development policy and practices. The environment is an academic field that systematically studies human interaction with the natural world, particularly the factors that have an influence on human well-being and sustainable development.

Upon the successful completion of the program, individuals will be equipped to work in the public sector as well as in private industry both at the national and international levels. Graduate students have the opportunity to be employed in governmental or non-governmental institutions which collaborate on development- or environment-related projects, especially at the positions where planning and future trends analysis is required. In addition, graduates can find careers in the private sector, especially in high-tech companies which monitor and formulate future trends in their industry.

How to apply?

Both programs are open to students from around the world. Foresight for Environment and Development program students, who are non-EU citizens, pay the annual fee of EUR 3,000. EU citizens are exempt from paying this fee. All students (EU and non-EU) of International Development Studies program pay the annual fee of EUR 3,000.

Entry Requirements

- A successfully completed undergraduate degree; preferably in subjects relevant to the respective program. However, candidates with other specializations may also be considered
- Good academic performance
- English language proficiency at a B2 Common European Framework level

To complete the application process successfully, students must provide the following documents to our study department:

- Copy of a passport
- Copy of a diploma proving completed Bachelor education
- Copy of a transcript of records of all the completed university courses at the time of application
- Proof of English language proficiency
- Curriculum Vitae
- Motivation letter (maximum 1,000 words)
- Two letters of recommendation

Scholarships

University Scholarships

Merit Scholarship and Master Course Scholarship for Foreigners are granted once a year to students with very good results based on the exam grades and credits received. Scholarships can altogether amount up to CZK 40,000 (an equivalent of more than EUR 1,500).

The Vavroušek Scholarship is designed to support student research projects in the fields of the development and the environment. Students supported by this scheme are given a scholarship ranging from CZK 2,000 up to CZK 25,000 depending on their project. The scholarship provided usually amounts to around 10,000 CZK (approximately EUR 400). For more information about this funding scheme, please see page 13.

The Mobility Scholarship supports internships and student research projects in other countries. Students supported by this scholarship are given CZK 3,000 (approximately EUR 120).

Students

Orientation Week

During the Orientation Week, which is regularly organized a week before the official beginning of the semester, you will be introduced to how things work at Palacký University, its faculties and departments.

The morning program provides students with information sessions focused on organizational and practical issues, such as an overview of university offices and coordinators, facilities, registration of courses, confirmation of documents, how to arrange an ID card, etc. Students can attend a Survival Czech Course, and learn about their rights and duties in the Czech Republic during a session with a police officer. The evening program is devoted to getting the students together and offering cultural, social and sporting events.

Sustainable Palacký

Students of the Department of Development & Environmental Studies founded the student initiative Sustainable Palacký whose main goal is to make the university environmentally sustainable, socially equitable and an economically efficient learning environment. Since its inception, the initiative has expanded and now involves many active members from different faculties. The association works on both spreading the sustainability awareness among students and pushing for long-term systematic changes in the functioning of the university.

Sustainable Palacký created the first student community garden in the Czech Republic and has held numerous documentary screenings and discussions with sustainability as its theme. Moreover, they have launched a successful campaign Think Out of the Bin which focuses on the improvement of waste management in student dormitories and by various public events shows the interconnectedness of environmental, social, and economic impacts of waste.

Bejdžink

Each November students of the department organize the truly unique “Bejdžink” event that should be attended by all students who want to become a member of the department. Different themes related to future challenges, environment, and development are presented every year (e.g. global warming, dealing with globalization etc.). According to the chosen topic, each class prepares a short comic sketch expressing its perception of the given theme. Bejdžink welcomes new students with a traditional ritual that each freshman should experience. This event is attended by all members of the Department of Development & Environmental Studies including the academic staff and graduate students.

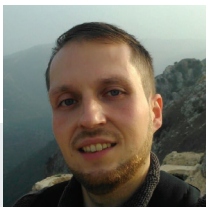

Erasmus+ program

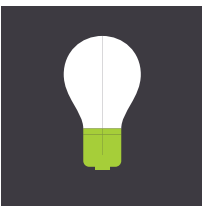
The Department of Development & Environmental Studies significantly supports international student mobility. Within the Erasmus+ program, our students may study up to 12 months at a chosen partner university abroad or do an internship in the selected organisation. This opportunity deepens the international experience which is a necessary precondition for working in the field of international development. All credits and exams acquired and accomplished abroad are accepted by the Department of Development & Environmental Studies. The Department of Development & Environmental Studies is currently cooperating with more than 20 universities which are listed below:

Vavroušek Scholarship

The Vavroušek Scholarship is an initiative of the Department of Development & Environmental Studies in Olomouc. It is offered to students of Bachelor and Master programs at the department. The aim of the scholarship is to support study abroad, internships and research projects in the field of the development cooperation. Many students use the experience and data collected during their stay abroad as the basis for their Bachelor or Master theses.

The call for scholarship applications opens at the beginning of winter and summer semesters.

Field Trips

During the studies at the Department of Development & Environmental Studies students may enroll in elective international field trips to developing regions or to international institutions and organizations (Brussels, Strasbourg, Vienna, Bratislava, Geneva etc.) related to international development. The aim of the field trips is to provide deeper knowledge about the development-related issues, which is enhanced by discussions with local experts who provide students with information about internships or future job prospects. Field trips usually last 5-10 days.

Cooperation with Foreign Lecturers

One of our highest priorities is cooperation with foreign academic departments where environmental studies programs and programs related to international development are offered. The aim of such cooperation is not only sharing experience and cooperation in research but also broadening the spectrum of courses taught within the department or enlisting new issues presented by foreign lecturers.

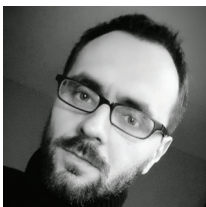
Assoc. Prof. Ivo Machar

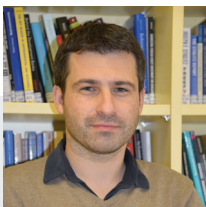
Mgr. Lenka Dušková, Ph.D.

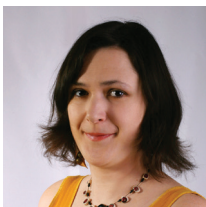
Mgr. Jiří Pánek, Ph.D.
